The FY 2024 KYOVA Interstate Planning Commission (Huntington, WV–KY–OH Urbanized Area) Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP) is prepared annually by the KYOVA Interstate Planning Commission to meet requirements of Federal and State transportation funding agencies. This 2024 UPWP contains transportation and environmental planning projects and programs to be conducted by KYOVA staff for state fiscal year (SFY) 2024, which begins July 1, 2023 and ends June 30, 2024. It is part of the official agreement between KYOVA, the West Virginia Department of Transportation (WVDOT/WVDOH), the Kentucky Transportation Cabinet (KYTC), and the Ohio Department of Transportation (ODOT). The UPWP is financed with combined Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) Planning (PL) Funds and the Federal Transit Administration (FTA) Section 5303 Planning Funds.

Planning Emphasis Areas (PEAs) for the FY 2024 Unified Planning Work Program include, but is not limited to: Climate Change, Equity and Justice40 in Transportation Planning, Title VI and Environmental Justice, Complete Streets, Public Involvement, coordination with U.S. Department of Defense (DOD)/Strategic Highway Network (STRAHNET) and Federal Land Management Agency (FLMA), Planning and Environment Linkages (PEL) studies, Transportation Planning Data, Access Ohio 2045, Walk.Bike.Ohio, Transport Ohio, and the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law (BIL).

Introduction

INTRODUCTION

PURPOSE

The KYOVA Interstate Planning Commission (Huntington, WV–KY–OH Urbanized Area) Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP) outlines the planning activities to be performed by all participants in the cooperative metropolitan planning process in the West Virginia counties of Cabell and Wayne; Kentucky counties of Boyd and Greenup; and the urbanized portion of Lawrence County, Ohio. The work program reflects a careful consideration of critical transportation issues currently facing the region as well as the analytical capabilities necessary to address them. The UPWP is required as a basis and condition for all federal funding assistance for transportation planning by the joint planning regulations of the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) and the Federal Transit Administration (FTA). Included within, is a proposed budget for the year's activities, complete with identification of the expected funding sources for said budget. Applicable federal statutes are: 23 USC 134(a), (f), and 49 USC 5303(a), (b). Primary federal regulations are 23 CFR 420.109, 23 CFR 450.314, and 49 CFR 613.

Under the provisions of the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA) (Public Law 117-58, also known as the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law [BIL]) planning emphasis will be placed Climate Change, Equity and Justice, Complete Streets, Public Involvement, and coordination with the U.S. Department of Defense (DOD) Strategic Highway Network (STRAHNET) the Federal Land Management Agency (FLMA), implementation of Planning and Environment Linkages (PEL), and advancing transportation data. Additionally, the states within the KYOVA planning area have established PEAs which will include but not be limited to: Implementation of the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law (BIL) to include a minimum of 2.5% of PL funding to increase safe and accessible options for multiple travel modes for people of all ages and abilities and incorporate the requirements of Section 11201 of BIL in the MPO Planning Process, Implementation of Access Ohio 2045, Walk.Bike.Ohio, and Transport Ohio programs, and Title VI and Environmental Justice.

All aspects of transportation planning taken herein will be conducted context sensitive to surrounding land-use and integrated with and in support of larger community goals related to economic development, preservation of environmental resources, responsible for existing infrastructure, safety and security within the transportation system, equitable participation, and maintenance of the quality of life in the region. The work elements herein will keep these goals in mind.

GOALS AND OBJECTIVES

KYOVA Interstate Planning Commissions goals and objectives are to conduct and implement a comprehensive multi-modal transportation planning process for KYOVA's planning area that is consistent with the USDOT Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA) (Public Law 117-58, also known as the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law [BIL]). The planning process shall be in the interest of advancing the economic and social welfare of all individuals within the planning area by producing an equitable plan for metropolitan transportation development and transportation facilities. Planned transportation facilities and activities shall provide adequate service for local and metropolitan movements of all persons, goods, and services as reflected in forecasts for future land-use, area development and to create access to opportunity. The goal shall be developed to generate projected patterns and quantities to aid in the future design of streets, highways and other transportation modes and facilities. KYOVA's Metropolitan Transportation Plan (MTP) is based on existing and projected land-use, as well as transportation and economic development characteristics, in specified increments of approximately four (4) years, to meeting the needs of the area through the year 2050.

Additionally, the MTP shall be physically and financially feasible and should be acceptable to the federal, state, and local agencies and capable of being revised due to unforeseen circumstances.

KYOVA GOALS

- Develop plans and programs that are consistent with the USDOT Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA) (Public Law 117-58, also known as the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law [BIL]).
- Improve the quality of life for the region's citizens by identifying ways to enhance regional transportation systems.
- Assist member governments and agencies in addressing local and regional transportation concerns in a continuing, cooperative, and comprehensive manner.
- Assure the equitable flow and prudent expenditures of public funds.

KYOVA OBJECTIVES

- Secure and share data to evaluate and assess the service provided by the existing transportation system.
- Establish a program for continuous updating of data as conditions change to permit periodic review of the plan by reflecting consideration of alternate activities.
- Create a truly functional relationship between transportation and balanced metropolitan development.
- Determine current transportation deficiencies and future needs, with respect to both facilities and operations, within the context of urban growth and foreseeable land-use changes.
- Provide early, effective, continuous public involvement, and technical planning support into the decision making process to encourage proactive participation by all parties and to provide legislative entities and the public with fully documented reports on transportation needs.
- Prepare realistic plans to improve all modes of transportation services and established programs and priorities for plan implementation.
- Maintain federal designations and planning processes and meet federal and state requirements for regional programs.

KYOVA PERFORMANCE TARGETS

KYOVA will complete the Performance Target Reports within 180 days of the last state's submission from our tri-state region (West Virginia, Kentucky, and Ohio) adoption of targets. A process has been developed jointly with each state DOT to report these targets and annual values as designated by FHWA and/or FTA. This process will be reviewed prior to each reporting period to evaluate and verify the reporting requirements are met.

PREVIOUS WORK

The FY 2023 End of Year Performance and Expenditure Report (P&E) will provide a complete accounting and narrative of the year's activities. During FY 2023 monthly reports and/or invoices were submitted to WVDOH/WVDOT, KYTC, and ODOT detailing completed activities.

HISTORY AND MISSION

KYOVA Interstate Planning Commission is an association of local governments in western West Virginia, northeastern Kentucky, and southern Ohio that serves as a forum for assessing and acting upon regional transportation concerns. KYOVA's goal is to promote cooperation among members, the governments closest to the people, and to maximize their capabilities for solving problems that cannot be solved by any one authority.

KYOVA was formally organized on October 11, 1968. Its creation, via interstate compact, was the culmination of years of thought initiated in 1965 with the beginning of the Huntington-Ashland-Ironton Area Transportation Study (HAIATS). KYOVA was formed from HAIATS to coordinate and administer transportation planning. In the late 1980s, the Kentucky counties seceded from the KYOVA Interstate Planning Commission and the Commonwealth of Kentucky designated FIVCO Area Development District to function as the MPO and to perform the transportation planning activities in Boyd and Greenup counties, Kentucky. In March 2012, the U.S. Census Bureau released its 2010 urbanized area (UZA) information which demonstrated that the Huntington, WV–KY–OH Urbanized Area grew in terms of land area and population. The 2010 population for the Huntington, WV-KY-OH Urbanized Area exceeded 200,000, and as a result of the population growth, the area was designated a Transportation Management Area (TMA). The newly designated Huntington, WV-KY-OH TMA added Boyd and Greenup counties, Kentucky to the previous West Virginia counties of Cabell and Wayne and the urbanized portion of Lawrence County, Ohio. Additionally, the areas of Hurricane and Teays Valley in Putnam County, West Virginia were included in the March 2012 TMA designation. As a result, beginning July 1, 2013, all MPO planning activities relating to the Boyd and Greenup counties in Kentucky were reunited with the KYOVA Interstate Planning Commission. However, the Regional Intergovernmental Council (RIC) located in Charleston, West Virginia continue oversight for the transportation planning activities for Putnam County.

To provide a recognized geographical area of activity, in 1966, the Bureau of the Census designated the urbanized area of Huntington-Ashland-Ironton as the Metropolitan Statistical Area (MSA). This area included: Cabell and Wayne counties in West Virginia; Boyd and Greenup counties in Kentucky; Lawrence County, Ohio; and the cities of Huntington, West Virginia; Ashland, Kentucky; and Ironton, Ohio. In 1973 and 1981 the Bureau of the Census expanded the MSA to include Carter County, Kentucky; however, they were not included in subsequent Censuses. On February 28, 2013, the Office of Management and Budget (OMB) redesignated the MSA based on the standards published in the June 28, 2010 Federal Register (75 FR 37246-37252) and Census Bureau data to include Putnam and Lincoln counties, West Virginia making the Huntington, WV MSA the largest in the state of West Virginia with seven (7) counties from a three-state region and a population estimate of 356,581 as of July 1, 2021¹.

AREA OVERVIEW

The Huntington, WV–KY–OH Transportation Management Area encompasses Cabell and Wayne counties and a portion of Putnam County in West Virginia, Boyd, and Greenup counties in Kentucky and




Figure 1: KYOVA Metropolitan Planning Boundary for the Huntington, WV-KY-OH TMA

the urbanized portion of Lawrence County, Ohio. This area encompasses the urban area for the present design year to 2050. As mentioned previously, RIC oversees the transportation planning for Putnam County, West Virginia. *Figure 1* depicts Huntington, WV-KY-OH Transportation Management Area, and the planning area for the KYOVA Interstate Planning Commission.




Figure 2: Civilian Labor Force Huntington-Ashland, WV-KY-OH (MSA) – January 2010 to January 2021

The Bureau of Labor Statistics of the U.S. Department of Labor published the Huntington-Ashland, WV-KY-OH Metropolitan Statistical Area's Civilian Labor force at 147,127 persons for the period ending January 2020, which was the most recent at the time of this report. The unemployment rate in October 2020 was 6 percent. *Figure 2* illustrates the Labor Force History from January 2010 to January 2021.

Air Quality

On November 29, 2018, EPA issued Transportation Conformity Guidance for the South Coast II Court Decision (EPA-420-B-18-050, November 2018) that addresses how transportation conformity determinations can be made in areas that were nonattainment or maintenance for the 1997 ozone NAAQS when the 1997 ozone NAAQS was revoked but were designated attainment for the 2008 ozone NAAQS in EPS's original designations for this NAAQS (May 21, 2012).

The transportation conformity regulation at 40 CFR 93109 sets forth the criteria and procedures for determination conformity. The conformity criteria for MTPs and TIPs include the latest planning assumptions (93.110), latest emissions model (93.111), consultation (93.112), transportation control measures (93.113(b) and (c), and emissions budget and/or interim emissions (93.118 and/or 93.119). For the 1997 ozone NAAQS areas, transportation conformity for MTPs and TPS for the 1997 ozone NAAQS areas, transportation conformity for MTPs and TPS for the 1997 ozone NAAQS can be demonstrated without a regional emissions analysis, per 40 CFR 93.109(c). This provision states that the regional emissions analysis requirement applies one year after the effective date of EPA's nonattainment designation for a NAAQS and until the effective date of revocation of such NAAAQS for an area. The 1997 ozone revocation was effective on April 6, 2015, and the South Coast II court upheld the revocation. As no regional emission analysis is required for the conformity determination, there is no requirement to use the latest emissions model, or budget or interim emissions test.

Therefore, based on the Transportation Conformity Guidance for the South Coast II Court Decision, the Huntington, WV-KY-OH Urbanized Area (KYOVA) has no maintenance areas but is subject to the South Coast decision and must complete a conformity report.

Local Participation and Boundaries

KYOVA Interstate Planning Commission welcomes the sound concept of more local participation in transportation planning, especially in areas where local concerns and plans for progress are best known

and understood. It is KYOVA's belief that local participation will result in a better understanding and cooperation among the general public and all governmental agencies involved in the transportation planning process.

KYOVA continues to examine and act upon broad transportation issues affecting communities that are within its planning area. KYOVA is responsible for the annual dissemination of millions of dollars in federal transportation funds to implement specific highway and transit projects. The division of the KYOVA Metropolitan Planning Area (Huntington, WV–KY–OH Urbanized Area), by state boundaries, presents obstacles to the transportation planning process. Different laws and procedures of each state must be taken into consideration, along with other controlling factors, such as the extent of industrial, residential, and business areas; location and services provided by transportation agencies and terminals; and proposed developments to serve a mobile population. These challenges can be objectively addressed by the counties and municipalities that form the Huntington, WV–KY–OH Urbanized Area. Social and economic factors that determine the pattern of future development must project future transportation needs and must also be considered in the planning process.

As a unified body, KYOVA Interstate Planning Commission is the forum which directs regional transportation matters. The forum represents regional "governance" by which the various counties, villages, townships, authorities, and districts, each with different responsibilities and missions, work together as a unit to address transportation issues through committees, task forces, workshops, and seminars. Some groups convene with state or federal agencies, local governments, private sector representatives and citizens to work on specific projects while others meet to investigate developing regional issues that may affect the future of the transportation system. The KYOVA communities within the Metropolitan Planning Organization present a united front to state and federal governments. Together, the region's counties and cities form a common alliance to promote a unified transportation system for the effective movement of people, goods, and services.

The Huntington, WV-KY-OH Urbanized Area transportation system relies on KYOVA's Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) and the Metropolitan Transportation Plan (MTP). The TIP and MTP must incorporate all short-and long-range requirements as defined in the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA)/Bipartisan Infrastructure Law (BIL) – the current transportation bill signed into law on November 15, 2021.

The predecessors to the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA)/Bipartisan Infrastructure Law (BIL), the FAST Act, Moving Ahead for Progress in the 21st Century ACT (MAP 21) and the Safe, Accountable, Flexible and Efficient Transportation Equity Act: A Legacy for Users (SAFETEA-LU), addressed challenges inherent to the modern transportation system, including safety, security, traffic congestion, intermodal connectivity, freight movement and environmental protection. SAFETEA-LU set forth eight planning factors that agencies were required to consider when developing their plans. The IIJA/BIL, MAP-21 and the FAST Act continued these planning factors, but the latter added two additional factors to expand from eight to ten. Planning Factors as it pertains to the KYOVA's FY 2024 Unified Planning Work Program and activities are identified on page 14.

KYOVA's FY 2024 Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP) also recognizes the six (6) Livability Principles as adopted by the U.S. Department of Transportation, the U.S. Departments of Housing and Urban Development and the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency. These Livability Principles are:

- Provide more transportation choices
- Promote equitable, affordable housing
- Enhance economic competitiveness
- Support existing communities
- Coordinate and leverage federal policies and investment
- Value communities and neighborhoods

ORGANIZATIONAL STRUCTURE

KYOVA's planning process is authorized by a Joint Resolution adopted by the states of West Virginia, Kentucky, and Ohio. The objectives and policies of KYOVA were formed under Chapter 8, Article 4C, Section 1, Official Code of West Virginia, 1931, as amended, now operating under revised Chapter 8, Article 26, Sections 1 through 5; Section 713.30 through 713.34, Ohio Revised Code and Chapter 65, and further described in the Articles of Agreement of the KYOVA Interstate Planning Commission (Huntington, WV–KY–OH Urbanized Area). KYOVA adopted the state of Kentucky's planning process as it relates to transportation and regional planning efforts.

The planning process provides the WVDOH/WVDOT, KYTC, and ODOT with the following:

- Prospectus;
- Work program and budget for the current year and each ensuing year in accordance with the Prospectus;
- Periodically updated, annually affirmed Metropolitan Transportation Plan (MTP) resulting from the process;
- Biennially updated Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) resulting from the process; and
- Periodic reporting of events, developments and accomplishments resulting from the transportation planning process.

The comprehensive scope of KYOVA Interstate Planning Commission (Huntington, WV-OH-OH Urbanized Area) requires an organizational structure that ensure all affected agencies and groups may participate in the development and coordination of the planning process, and that the work be caried forward in an efficient manner to develop the plan within the scheduled time and financial budget. Furthermore, Section 23 CFR 450.310 (d) states that each metropolitan planning organization that serves as a designated Transportation Management Area (TMA) shall consist of local elected officials; officials, of public agencies that administer or operation major modes of transportation in the metropolitan area, including representation by providers of public transportation; and appropriate state officials.

To fulfill the federal requirement, identified individuals serve on the KYOVA transportation committees where they provide technical advice and public support in order for the region to realize its full potential. Proper technical staffing is also essential to attain KYOVA's objectives. A description of KYOVA's committee structure, based on KYOVA Bylaws and 23 CFR 301 (d), is as follows:

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

The Executive Committee is comprised of the chief elected officials or their designated appointee from within the KYOVA Planning Boundary. From its membership, a smaller Executive Board is appointed to oversee the routine work. Staff will report to the Executive Committee on administrative and procedural matters.

POLICY COMMITTEE (PC)

The Policy Committee (PC) consists of 42 voting members who are comprised of representatives from: Cabell, Wayne, and Putnam counties, West Virginia; the city of Huntington, West Virginia; Boyd and Greenup counties, Kentucky; the city of Ashland, Kentucky; Lawrence County, Ohio; and the city of Ironton, Ohio and one member from each of the three local/regional transit agencies. KYOVA's Policy Board Members, the formal decision-making body, is determined by established Bylaws. The Bylaws provide a seat for identified locally elected officials and their appointees and are not selected by the MPO. KYOVA encourages member governments to consider diversity when making appointee selections. All meetings and official activities of the MPO are held in buildings and locations that comply with accessibility standards according to the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA).

FY 2024 UPWP PLANNING TASKS SUMMARY

To accomplish the planning program requirements, KYOVA develops an annual Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP) identifying specific planning work tasks to be conducted. This Work Program identifies specific objectives to be attained, methodology to be used, products to be developed, functional responsibilities, and financial participation. The following provides a summary of KYOVA's FY 2024 UPWP Planning (PL) funded work elements. Detailed activities are included in the individual work elements found in Section II of this document.

380124 – Management and Administration activities are directed toward administering the day-to-day administrative, contract management, Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP), Title VI and Americans Disability Act (ADA) oversight/complaint activities, Disadvantaged Business Enterprise (DBE), and financial planning activities that ensure that the MPO conform to internal policy, as well as the policies and legal requirements set forth by WVDOH, KYTC, ODOT, and federal agencies and obligations stated in the USDOT legislation set forth in the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA)/Bipartisan Infrastructure Law (BIL).

380224 – Short-Range Planning and Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) consists of short-range planning activities which supports the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA)/Bipartisan Infrastructure Law (BIL) legislation for the near-term transportation needs within the KYOVA planning area. The short-range program is designed to identify deficient areas, provide a solution to the deficiency, and initiate strategies to eliminate such challenges. Additionally, Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) maintenance, which provides a four-year biennially updated listing of transportation projects by funding category and construction phase; performance measures, safety and security planning, transportation resilience/reliability panning and studies, freight planning, pedestrian/bicycle planning, administration of the Surface Transportation Block Group (STBG) Program dedicated funds, and assistance in implementation of ODOT's Walk.Bike.Ohio Access initiative fall under the Short-Range Planning and TIP work element.

380324 – Metropolitan Transportation Planning guides the long-term development of transportation improvements for a period of approximately twenty (20) years. KYOVA's Metropolitan Transportation Plan (MTP) provides the guidance for the Huntington, WV-KY-OH Urbanized Area through 2050. The goals and objectives of the MTP are based upon the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA)/Bipartisan Infrastructure Law (BIL) legislation, planning regulations, changes in population, commercial activities, industrial development, and patterns of growth. The MTPs intent is to maximize the benefits of available funding provided by all government agencies for transportation improvements in the service area; provide local governments with information on future system demands with alternative solutions to meet those demands which will allow sound transportation policy decisions. During FY 2024 KYOVA will coordinate with ODOT to Implement Access Ohio 2045 themes, strategies, and actions.

380424 – Transportation Surveillance and Geographic Information System (GIS) provides for collection and maintenance of data files and transportation modelling. Data collection and analysis in support of transportation equity, public involvement, and Planning and Environmental Linkages (PEL) studies and plans, land-use, transportation crash/fatalities/traffic accident program data files all play an important role to improve transportation decision-making services to the region. As one part of the data analysis, KYOVA utilizes a TransCAD travel demand modeling software that is continually refined to provide the most accurate traffic forecast volumes, economic data, travel time segments, etc.

380524 – Air Quality Planning and Conformity places an emphasis on air quality planning activities that ensure the transportation planning activities are consistent and meet requirements as outlined by the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA)/Bipartisan Infrastructure Law (BIL), the Federal Clean Air Act (as amended), US EPA Guidance, State Environmental Agencies, and local and state government clean air goals.

380624 – Public Participation addresses the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA)/Bipartisan Infrastructure Law (BIL) regulation and focuses on three basic principles: 1) ensure public involvement of low-income and minority group in decision-making; 2) prevent high and adverse impacts of decisions on low-income and minority groups; and 3) ensure low-income and minority groups receive their proportionate share of benefits. This element also addresses the Participation Plan maintenance, public outreach activities for amendments and administrative modifications/adjustments to the MTP, TIP, Human Transportation Services Coordination Plan, and Title VI/Environmental Justice and LEP document updates.

380724 – **Surface Transportation Program (STP) Planning** provides for sustainable development through interagency cooperative practices and management strategies that target increased accessibility, cleaner air and water, improved health conditions and broad-based economic, community development and recovery through the metropolitan planning process and surface transportation planning.

380824 – Transit Planning – West Virginia & Ohio provides for coordinated transit planning activities for the West Virginia and Ohio counties within the KYOVA Planning Boundary. It also includes transit coordination with the Kentucky counties (Boyd and Greenup), also within the KYOVA Planning Area. Other activities include data collection and planning support, assistance with Section 5307, 5339, 5310 programs, and maintaining KYOVA's Coordinated Public Transit-Human Services Transportation Plan.

380924 – **Section 5310 Administration** in this activity KYOVA partners with the Tri-State Transit Authority (TTA) in the administration of the Huntington, WV-KY-OH Urbanized Area Section 5310 Program.

381024 – KYOVA/RIC Joint TMA Coordination (WV) provides support to coordinate with the Regional Intergovernmental Council (RIC) and other agencies regarding federally mandated TMA planning, programming, and funding for the Huntington, WV-KY-OH Urbanized Area to include Putnam County, West Virginia.

381124 – Lawrence County, Ohio Transit-Deviated Fixed-Route – CMAQ project will support and perform transit operation planning to the Lawrence County Transit (LCT). Funding to be provided by CMAQ – Ohio.

381224 – Lawrence County, OH Specific project will provide transportation planning services/activities specific to Lawrence County, Ohio.

381324/381424/381524 – **Complete Streets Designated Activity** – support activities specifically directed toward the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA)/Bipartisan Infrastructure Law (BIL) Complete Streets regulation to provide an equitable and safe transportation network for travelers of all ages and abilities.

381624 – Barboursville WV to Proctorville, OH Bridge Crossing PEL Study (WV Specific) will conduct a Study to include PEL along WV Rt 2 to OH Rt 7 bridge crossing – this is the WV funding portion.

381724 – US-60/Newman's Branch Road Intersection Study (WV Specific) will conduct a traffic study along US-60 near Milton Elementary School.

381824 – Barboursville WV to Proctorville, OH Bridge Crossing PEL Study (OH Specific) will conduct a study to include PEL along WV Rt 2 to OH Rt 7 bridge crossing – this is the Ohio funding portion.

381924 – Lawrence County, OH SRTS and Safety Analysis (OH Specific) will work with Lawrence County Schools to gather information to develop improvements for intersections throughout the county.

382024 – Boyd County US-60/KY-180 Corridor Management Study (KY Specific) will complete a corridor management plan in Boyd County, KY along US-60/KY-180 from KY-3 to the Ashland City limits.

382124 – Ohio River Valley Tri- State Safety Action Plan project will provide funding to complete a comprehensive Safety Action Plan for the Tri-State Region funded through the SS4A program.

385124 – Kentucky 5303 Transit Planning – this element provides for coordinated planning activities to oversee and develop the transit planning process, program, and activities for the Kentucky Section 5303 funding dedicated to Boyd and Greenup Counties which are located in the Huntington, WV-KY-OH Urbanized Area.

PLANNING FACTORS

The FAST Act, the previous transportation bill, defined ten specific "Planning Factors" for developing transportation plans and programs. These planning factors which ensure the local transportation planning process is consistent with national goals and objectives continue with the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA)/Bipartisan Infrastructure Law (BIL).

Planning Factors

- 1. Support the economic vitality of the KYOVA Planning Area (Huntington, WV–KY–OH Urbanized Area), especially by enabling global competitiveness, productivity, and efficiency;
- 2. Increase the safety of the transportation system for motorized and non-motorized uses;
- 3. Increase the security of the transportation system for motorized and non-motorized users;
- 4. Increase accessibility and mobility of people and freight;
- 5. Protect and enhance the environment, promote energy conservation, improve quality of life, and promote consistency between transportation improvements and state and local planned growth and economic development patterns;
- 6. Enhance the integration and connectivity of the transportation system, across and between modes, for people and freight;
- 7. Promote efficient system management and operation;
- 8. Emphasize the preservation of the existing transportation system;
- 9. Improve the resiliency and reliability of the transportation system and reduce or mitigate stormwater impacts of surface transportation; and
- 10. Enhance travel and tourism.

GOALS

The *Management and Administrative* work element goal is to facilitate the efficient administration of the transportation planning program and to efficiently manage and meet federal, state, local governments, and public transit agencies regulatory, administrative, and management requirements within the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA)/Bipartisan Infrastructure Law (BIL) and state planning regulations.

METHODOLOGY

This work Element provides for the management and administrative activities for the FY 2024 UPWP. Activities include but are not limited to:

- 1. Administration and Management
 - KYOVA Staff will provide monthly progress and year end Performance Expenditure reports, audits, budget management, lease agreements, multi-party planning agreements, DBE program reports, program self-certification, and equipment and supply purchases.
 - Dissemination and public knowledge of information is necessary for a successful transportation planning program. During FY 2024, KYOVA Staff will maintain committee membership lists and will provide information to the Policy Committee (PC), Technical Advisory Committee (TAC), Executive Board, and citizens-at-large. Representation and activities include but are not limited to public ports, providers of transportation services, both private and public.
 - Training is paramount in order to successfully fulfill the transportation planning functions. To
 ensure staff is up to date on program activities, federal and state requirements, KYOVA staff will
 attend trainings and/or host meetings, courses, seminars, workshops, and conference calls. At
 times meeting cost may be incurred and for eligible expenses, KYOVA Staff will secure and pay
 for printing charges and meeting space outside the KYOVA Office.
 - KYOVA will review the interagency agreements for federal, state, and local partners and update as needed.
 - Direct charges solely for transportation planning activities and/or events that do not fall directly
 under one of the other work elements within the KYOVA FY 2024 UPWP will be charged to this
 element.

2. Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP)

The UPWP is an annual document outlining the work activities to be accomplished during the fiscal year. During FY 2024 KYOVA Staff will amend or make any necessary corrections to the FY 2024 UPWP and provide the Draft and Final FY 2025 UPWP as defined by the West Virginia Department of Highways (WVDOT/WVDOH), the Kentucky Transportation Cabinet (KYTC), the Ohio Department of Transportation (ODOT), the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA), and the Federal Transit

Administration (FTA). The UPWP element includes completion of the Annual Performance and Expenditure Report.

3. <u>Title VI/LEP/EJ Oversight</u>

Oversight activities for the Title VI/LEP Plan and Environmental Justice complaint procedures will be managed by the KYOVA Title VI Coordinator to ensure policies and activities are in accordance with local, state, and federal regulations.

GOALS

The Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) and Short-Range Planning work element provides support to fulfill TIP development/oversight and short-range planning activities. TIP activities will develop and manage an effective, multi-year TIP that identifies and prioritizes transportation improvements. Projects are to be consistent with transportation plans and studies developed through the urban transportation planning process and to ensure the TIP is fiscally and air quality constrained. Short-range planning activities include development of a transportation system that will safely and efficiently accommodate the traffic flow and encourage advancement for all modes that is ADA compliant while implementing legislation from the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA)/Bipartisan Infrastructure Law (BIL).

METHODOLOGY

1. Transportation Improvement Program (TIP)

The TIP is a biennial statement for state and local governments and transit authorities. It is part of a four-year schedule of prioritized and anticipated spending on specific transportation projects and improvements in conjunction with each State Transportation Improvement Program (STIP) for the KYOVA Planning Area (West Virginia, Kentucky, and Ohio). To fulfill this work element, the following activities will be undertaken.

- TIP Maintenance and Conformity will be assured through the staff's on-going consultation with federal, state, and local governments, as well as the general public. Staff will undertake the following:
 - Monitor and reconcile projects in the TIP through Amendments and/or Administrative Modifications. Amendments and Administrative Modifications will be processed as outlined in the current KYOVA Participation Plan. Identified projects will reflect current projects on each state DOTs STIP and be fiscally constrained (to include all regionally significant projects) and progressing toward implementation. KYOVA will follow guidance and timelines as provided by each state DOTs. KYOVA will follow DOTs S/TIP Development Schedule to complete TIP updates.
 - Staff support activities
 - Management and administration of the TIP to include review and update of TIP fiscal constraint documents.
 - Eligible meeting expenses of hosting meetings outside the KYOVA office to accommodate for space to better engage KYOVA committee members and the community-at-large.

- Host and/or participate in meetings facilitated by WVDOT/DOH, KYTC, ODOT, local transit agencies, FHWA, FTA, and other local or planning agencies to establish new and expand existing transportation partnerships.
- Performance Measures
 - KYOVA will coordinate with the state DOTs to successfully report targets as established in the federal guidelines. Additionally, KYOVA will review current policies, rules and procedures to determine project impact on safety for all road users to include those outside of automobiles.
 - Integration of performance measures will be completed through an established reporting process which will illustrate the targets consistency with the Infrastructure and Jobs Act (IIJA)/Bipartisan Infrastructure Law (BIL).
- Reports and monitoring plays an important role to ensure the transportation system meets the community needs as well as to federal, state, and local needs/requirements. KYOVA will perform the following to ensure those needs are met.
 - Monitor the Ellis System monitoring (OH specific activity) and report inconsistencies to ODOT between Ellis and the KYOVA TIP project schedule.
 - Performance Measures and the reporting process will be integrated and consistent with the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA)/Bipartisan Infrastructure Law (BIL).
 - Project conformity determination and reports will be completed, as needed.
 - Prioritization of short-range projects will be undertaken, as needed.
 - Annual Listing of Obligated Projects: The Annual Listing of Obligated Project report for highway, transit, and planning projects funded with federal funds will be completed within 90 days of the end of the state fiscal year for West Virginia and Ohio (9/30/23) and within 90 days of the end of the federal fiscal year for Kentucky (12/31/23), or as otherwise directed by each state's DOT.
- 2. Short-term initiatives

Short-term initiatives relating to transportation of persons, goods, and freight in the KYOVA planning area (Huntington, WV-KY-OH Urbanized Area) will be reviewed and assessed to identify actions that present a systematic approach challenges. These activities may include:

<u>Complete Streets Planning</u>

Complete Streets Planning to include the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA)/Bipartisan Infrastructure Law (BIL) regulations along with the state and local initiatives to include implementation assistance/coordination with ODOTs Walk.Bike.Ohio to encourage active transportation (OH specific activity). Activities may include:

- Assessment and evaluation of active transportation in the KYOVA region. This may include vehicular, bicycle, pedestrian, transit, and other non-motorized transportation with consideration of travel and tourism.
- System performance analysis to identify regional active transportation priorities and investigate innovative ways to optimize funding for active transportation projects.
- KYOVA Staff to serve as a technical resource to local jurisdictions for active transportation activities and provide assistance to potential recipients to plan, develop, and operate streets and networks that prioritize safety and security, comfort, and access to destinations for people who use the street network, including pedestrians, bicyclists, transit riders, micromobility users, freight delivery services, and motorists.

- Plan to reconnect communities and to support livable communities through facilitating more environmentally friendly forms of mobility, such as walking, biking, and public transit.
- Plan to provide equitable and safe transportation network for travelers of all ages and abilities.
- Consider arterial roads and bicycle facilities to include safe pedestrian facilities, safe transit stops, and safe crossing opportunities.
- Promote to improve safety and security, and accessible for all road users and while making ADA compliant.
- Technical assistance to the West Virginia Association of MPOs, KY MPO Director's Council, and Ohio Council of Regional Councils (OARC).
- Provide support to ODOT with Access Ohio 2045 Implementation of themes, strategies, and actions to include multi-modal corridor studies collaboration; alignment of strategies with MTP; statewide safety and security initiative collaboration; transportation data sharing; and establishing new and expanding existing transportation partnerships.
- Develop, promote, and encourage effective working relationships among state, local and federal transportation officials, and other stakeholders responsible for various aspects of transportation infrastructure protection, emergency management, and system operations to reduce vulnerability of existing transportation infrastructure to natural disasters.
- Planning and Environmental Linkages
 - Encourage agencies (DOTs, Public Transit, etc.) to implement PEL as part of the transportation planning and environmental review process.
 - During planning activities, consider timeline of projects and eligibility under FHWA's NEPAs Categorical Exclusion environmental review regulations 23 CFR Part 771(c)(3).
- <u>Climate Change</u>
 - Identification of transportation vulnerabilities to climate change impacts and evaluate potential solutions and plan to improve the condition, resilience and safety of road and bridge assets consistent with asset management plans. Once identified, prioritization of projects/activities to determine those less vulnerable and more resilient to changing climate.
 - Inclusion of resiliency of the transportation system and activities to reduce stormwater runoff and greenhouse gas emission.
- Freight
 - Participation in local, state, regional, and national freight initiatives.
 - Education of governmental officials and the general public.
 - Consultation with WVDOH, KYTC, and ODOT freight divisions to ensure that Critical Urban Freight Corridors and Critical Rural Freight Corridors in the Huntington, WV-KY-OH TMA are identified in the state's National Highway Freight System.
 - Coordination for Strategic Highway Network (STRAHNET)/Department of Defense (DOD); and work with stakeholders concerning programs and data sources available to support freight transportation activities and facilities.
- <u>Transportation Planning Coordination</u>
 - Coordinate and consult with FLMAs and officials responsible for housing (when warranted) in the transportation planning and project programming process on infrastructure and connectivity needs related to access routes and other public roads and transportation services that connect to Federal lands and housing. This may include opportunities to leverage transportation funding to support access and transportation needs.
 - Participation and coordination activities with WVDOT/WVDOH, KYTC, ODOT, FHWA, and FTA, and other transportation planning partners to include scoping studies initiated by KYTC, WVDOT and ODOT.

- Review current policies, rules, and procedures to determine project impact on safety for all road users to include those outside of automobiles.
- Dissemination of information and project updates to elected officials, administrators, state, and federal agencies, and the general public.
- Provide assistance to LPAs regarding ADA Transition Plans.
- Technical assistance to the West Virginia Association of MPOs, KY MPO Director's Council, and Ohio Council of Regional Councils (OARC).
- Eligible meeting expenses of hosting meetings outside the KYOVA office to accommodate for space and to better engage KYOVA committee members and the community-at-large.
- Staff support for Short-Range Transportation Planning not specifically identified above.
- 3. KYOVA Surface Transportation Block Grant Program

KYOVA, as the designated TMA for the Huntington, WV-KY-OH TMA receives federal suballocated funds through the Surface Transportation Block Grant Program (STBG), the STBG Set-Aside Program, ODOT Congestion and Mitigation Air Quality Program (CMAQ) for Lawrence County, OH, along with recent Covid Relieve Act funds. To guarantee accuracy, keep track of the funding, and to promote the program, KYOVA will oversee, maintain and be responsible for the fiscal management of the dedicated STBG funding program.

To assess, propose and support a multi-modal network relative to highways, transit (public transportation and human services transportation), bicycle/pedestrian, safety, freight, air quality and other transportation related activities while continuing development for Performance Measure reporting to meet the region's transportation needs at least 20 years into the future.

METHODOLOGY

Metropolitan Planning Organizations (MPOs) must maintain a focus on managing the existing infrastructure while considering environmental effects of its planning process. Staff will undertake the following to fulfill the Metropolitan Transportation Planning activities:

1. <u>Metropolitan Transportation Plan</u>

The Metropolitan Transportation Plan (MTP) is a long-range planning document that identifies transportation deficiencies, policies, strategies, and projects over the next 20 plus years. The MTP is updated on a four-year cycle. As the metropolitan planning organization (MPO) for the Huntington, WV-KY-OH urbanized area, KYOVA is required to conduct a continuing, cooperative, and comprehensive (3-C) transportation planning process – with a 20-year horizon – thus, the Metropolitan Transportation Plan (MTP). KYOVA adopted the KYOVA 2050 MTP April 22, 2022 and became effective August 26, 2022. The MTP serves as the foundation for the development of the Transportation Improvement Program (TIP). To ensure the MTP is meeting these goals KYOVA staff will:

- Maintain and updated the 2050 MTP to include processing Amendments and/or Administrative Modifications, and prioritization of projects while demonstrating a fiscally and physically constrained financial plan.
- Integration and evaluation of current performance measures for consistency of the reporting process as outlined in the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA)/Bipartisan Infrastructure Law (BIL) and presented in the MTP.
- Engage FHWA, FTA, FLMAs, and providers of public transit to review current and new metropolitan transportation plans to advance Federal investments to disadvantaged communities.

- Coordination activities and provide support to ODOT for alignment of Access Ohio 2045 strategies with KYOVA MTP and future MTP updates to include: multi-modal corridor studies collaboration; statewide safety and security initiative collaboration; transportation data sharing; and establishing new and expanding existing transportation partnerships.
- 2. Long-Range Planning Activities

To deliver a safe, reliable and integrated transportation system KYOVA must evaluate needs, and develop multimodal initiatives and recommendations that connect needs across all modes of transportation for KYOVA planning area. These efforts will be completed through the Long-Range Planning Activities as stated below.

- Consider issues relative to highways, transit (public transportation and human services transportation), bicycle/pedestrian, safety, freight, air quality and other transportation related activities.
- Review of current policies, rules, and procedures to determine project impact on safety for all road users to include those outside of automobiles.
- Coordinate with state DOTs, FTA, FHWA, and providers of public transportation to explore
 opportunities and advance equity and support for underserved and disadvantaged communities
 by improving infrastructure by accommodating new and emerging technologies like electric
 vehicle charging stations, renewable energy generation, and broadband deployment in
 transportation rights of way.
- Coordination and collaboration with private and public transit providers, state and local agencies, and the general public continue to evaluate the area's transportation network.
- Identification, evaluation, and coordination to promote livable communities through facilitating
 more environmentally friendly forms of mobility, such as walking, biking, and public transit, and
 increasing the number of routine destinations that are safely and comfortably accessible
 through these modes.
- Investigate social welfare, economic factors and environmental impacts that determine future transportation patterns and development.
- Utilize, coordinate, and establish a process to report KYOVA's Performance Measures to compliment the decision-making process with WVDOT/WVDOH, KYTC, ODOT, FHWA, and FTA when choosing projects for inclusion in the MTP and as it relates to Transport Ohio and/or the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA)/Bipartisan Infrastructure Law (BIL), and any subsequent transportation legislation.
- Review WVDOT/WVDOH, KYTC, and ODOT statewide transportation plans; update the federal aid functional classification system and National Highway System, including intermodal connectors, and serve as a technical resource on freight to local jurisdictions, as requested.
- Project prioritization activities and procedures for all modes and project types to include procedures relating to KYOVA's suballocated Surface Transportation Block Grant (STBG) Program, STBG Set Aside Program, and the Ohio CMAQ dedicated suballocated funds.
- Educate agencies and the public at large how modes in the existing system can be managed and operated more efficiently.
- Continue participation in regional, state, local and national forums projects for addressing federal, state, and local planning requirements such as updates to the West Virginia, Kentucky, and Ohio transportation plans.

- Coordination with representatives from DOD in the coordination and connectivity needs for STRAHNET routes and other public roads that connect to DOD facilities and Federal Land Management Agency (FMLA) for infrastructure and connectivity needs related to access routes and other public roads and services that connect to Federal lands.
- Coordinate with FLMAs (when warranted) in the transportation planning and project programming process on infrastructure and connectivity needs related to access routes and other public roads and transportation services that connect to Federal lands. This may include opportunities to leverage transportation funding to support access and transportation needs.
- Create and/or modify projects in the KY CHAF database and assist with Kentucky's SHIFT Project Prioritization activities (KY specific project), project prioritization and inclusion of projects from the Ohio Technical Review Advisory Committee (TRAC) to include staff time, travel, and preparation to present to the TRAC (OH specific project).
- Include freight and aviation planning with long-range goals and develop ways to optimize funding to improve the safety and efficiency of freight movement through the intermodal transportation system for the traveling population and goods to include Transport Ohio implementation strategies with the MTP.
- Prioritized project list from the CMP to be incorporated into the long-range transportation planning activities and the MTP. The prioritized list will be funded based on need and availability of funds.

- 1. An up to date and compliant long-range transportation plan (Metropolitan Transportation Plan MTP) for the KYOVA planning area (Huntington WV-KY-OH Urbanized Area).
- Long-Range Transportation Planning activities that will deliver a safe, reliable and integrated transportation system by development of multimodal initiatives and recommendations that connect needs across all modes of transportation for KYOVA planning area that will investigate social welfare, economic factors, and environmental impacts that determine future transportation patterns and development.

PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT

Meetings, training, and travel required to aid the KYOVA staff in the Metropolitan (long-range) Transportation Planning process. This may include but is not limited to meetings, conferences, and training activities with WVDOT/WVDOH, KYTC, ODOT, FHWA; FTA, EPA, Ohio Association of Regional Councils (OARC); National Transit Institute (NTI), National Highway Institute (NHI), National Association of Regional Councils (NARC) Conferences, National Association of Development Organizations (NADO) Annual Training Conference, Washington Policy Conference, National Regional Transportation Conference; Kentuckians for Better Transportation (KBT) Annual Conference and meetings, Association of Metropolitan Planning Organizations (AMPO) Annual Conference, and American Association of State Highway and Transportation Officials (AASHTO) Planning Conferences/GIS Transportation Symposium.

GOALS

To provide support for various transportation projects and programs through data collection (historical inventory of transportation related data such as land-use, population, employment, environmental justice, traffic counts, crash data, etc.); modeling (air quality, travel demand model, socioeconomic, etc.); general analysis, consideration of connected vehicle technology; and evaluation by using transportation modeling and GIS to create maps and other visualization products.

METHODOLOGY

1. GIS and Database Development and Data Sharing

GIS is an information system specializing in the input, management, analysis, and reporting of geographical (spatially related) information which can help transportation planners integrate agency-wide information to achieve better operational efficiencies and results. To illustrate how the information can be utilized to achieve these goals, KYOVA will:

- Utilize Arc GIS Pro as a tool to manipulate, evaluate, update and query the KYOVA maintained databases to enhance the methodology for seamless editing of regional highway and transit networks and provide ongoing maintenance of existing GIS network editing tools. New GIS applications may be developed to facilitate validation of analysis of highway and transit. Examples of these activities include:
 - GIS activities and updates to include current U. S. Census datasets; land-use model and processes; analysis of socio-economic and other data to support economic development, transportation equity, and Planning and Environmental Linkages (PEL) studies, and collection of data to justify project prioritization and project development..
 - On-going maintenance and technical support for planning activities to include the TIP, MTP, highway/roadway and bicycle/pedestrian projects, regional studies, traffic flow maps, freight analysis, and the data network.
 - To strengthen WVDOT/WVDOH, KYTC, ODOT HPMS and safety programs and initiatives, KYOVA will collect data; utilize NPMRDS for data analysis;
 - Encourage and work with State DOTs, FHWA, FTA and other agencies to incorporate data sharing and consideration into the transportation planning process. Topics to be addressed as aspects of regional transportation coordination planning may include:
 - Linkage with emergency transportation planning, to include COVID-19, by addressing the interrelationships for everyday transportation management; operations and technology with preparedness planning for regional emergencies, including technical, procedural, and organizational aspects; traffic signals to assist member agencies in the exchange and coordination of interjurisdictional traffic signal operations information and activities; travel information to coordinate enhancement of the collection, processing and delivery of real-time roadway and transit condition information,

including regional "511" telephone information systems; transportation safety, such as crash locations in the Huntington, WV-KY-OH Urbanized Area.

- GIS activities and updates to include current U. S. Census datasets; land-use model and processes; analysis of socio-economic and other data to support economic development, transportation equity, and Planning and Environmental Linkages (PEL) studies.
- 2. Socioeconomic/Demographic Research and Analysis

Socioeconomic and Demographic analysis is essential to carry out the transportation planning functions. Work activities for FY 2024 will focus on analysis and sharing of the 2020 Census datasets. These task may include:

- Analysis of socio-economic and other data to support economic development, transportation
 equity, Planning and Environmental Linkages (PEL) studies, evaluation of low-income and
 minority populations and/or disproportionately high and adverse impacts as it relates to public
 participation, Title VI/Environmental Justice/LEP activities and communities with higher
 concentrations of older adults and those with poor access to essential services and collection
 of data to justify project prioritization and project development. The reports may incorporate
 unique visualizations to illustrate future growth and stability for the region
- KYOVA Staff will provide support activities for the Ohio Technical Review Advisory Committee (TRAC), Kentucky CHAF and SHIFT process, planning studies, as requested, and public involvement activities.
- 3. <u>Travel Demand Model (TDM)</u>

A Travel Demand Model (TDM) is a tool to support the urban transportation planning process. It is a series of analytical techniques used to predict future demand for transportation facilities and services and estimates the impacts of policies and program on behavior and travel demand. A TDM can predict how changes in size and character of the population will impact the transportation system in the future. KYOVA's model base year is 2020, with future years 2030, 2040, and 2050.

- KYOVA will continue validation of the TransCAD travel forecasting model for the base year 2020 and the future horizon year of 2050.
- KYOVA will develop and/or maintain the current Travel Demand Model (TDM) to coincide with the 2020 Census and ensure it will provide the most relevant information for planning studies, traffic flow maps, freight analysis/movement, land-use attributes such as planned development/closures of hospitals and schools, etc. During development, KYOVA will coordinate with WVDOH, KYTC-Modal Branch, and ODOT for travel time segments and other similar data.
- 4. Intelligent Transportation Systems (ITS)

ITS improves transportation safety and mobility and enhances productivity through the integration of advanced communications technologies into the transportation infrastructure and in vehicles. ITS systems encompass a broad range of wireless and wire line communications-based information and electronics technologies. These technologies include Vehicle to Vehicle (V2V) Communications for Safety; Vehicle to Infrastructure (V2I) Communications for Safety; Real-Time Data Capture Management; Dynamic Mobility Applications; Road Weather Management; Applications for the Environment; Human Factors; Mode-Specific Research; Exploratory Research; and Cross-Cutting Activities. NOTE: KYOVA relies on each statewide (WVDOH/KYTC/ODOT) ITS Architecture/Plan.

KYOVA will assist WVDOH, KYTC, and ODOT, as requested, in maintaining their statewide ITS architectures for the Metropolitan Planning Area in accordance with federal law and regulation. Additionally, KYOVA will assist in the coordination of the use of the regional ITS architecture as guidance to regional project implementation to include activities and training that address connected vehicle technology.

GOALS

To ensure that the transportation planning activities in the KYOVA Metropolitan Planning Area are consistent and meet requirements as outlined by the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA)/Bipartisan Infrastructure Law (BIL), the Federal Clean Air Act (as amended); the US Environmental Protection Agency guidance; National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA); State Environmental Agencies; and local and state government clean air goals.

METHODOLOGY

<u>Air Quality Planning</u>

KYOVA Staff will engage in air quality planning which will identify transportation strategies to support emission reduction from on-road mobile sources of pollution.

- Coordinate air quality planning with external conformity partners, including the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), state Division of Air Quality, WVDOT, KYTC, ODOT, Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) and the Federal Transit Administration (FTA).
- \circ Review project environmental impact statements (EIS), as requested.
- Project identification, evaluations, and ODOT justification application as related to CMAQ and other air quality programs.
- Prioritization of KY CMAQ applicant projects, as requested by KYTC Office of Local Programs and/or KYTC Central Office. *Note: this is a Kentucky specific activity.*
- Evaluate opportunities to reduce greenhouse gas emissions and identification of transportation system vulnerabilities to climate change impacts as well as evaluating potential solutions.
- Research and promote programs and energy conscious projects that reduce ground-level Ozone, PM_{2.5}, and those that create no significant impact on air quality in the Huntington, WV-KY-OH Urbanized Area, and support Transit Oriented Development (TOD) activities.
- <u>Transportation Conformity</u>

Transportation conformity is a way to ensure that Federal funding and approval goes to those transportation activities that are consistent with air quality goals. Conformity applies to the transportation plans, Transportation Improvement Programs (TIPs), and project funded or approved by the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) or the Federal Transit Administration (FTA) in areas that do not meet or previously have not met air quality standards for ozone, carbon monoxide, particulate matter, or nitrogen dioxide. These areas are known as 'nonattainment areas' or 'maintenance areas.² KYOVA Staff will complete the following Transportation conformity activities to fulfill this requirement

- KYOVA may periodically perform analysis, review, assess, and coordinate air quality programs in the region as contributed to 8-hour ozone redesignation for MTP and TIP projects and updates; identify potential projects; coordinate funding under the Congestion Mitigation and Air Quality (CMAQ) Program – Ohio and work with local jurisdictions to build a reservoir of projects for inclusion in the MTP and TIP and ensure projects are consistent with federal air quality regulations and guidelines, support Transit Oriented Development (TOD) activities. Relate Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA)/Bipartisan Infrastructure Law (BIL) Performance Measures to the performance of the NHS, Freight, and CMAQ Measures and coordinate with WVDOT/WVDOH, KYTC, ODOT, FHWA, and FTA to integrate and develop a reporting process. Continue to develop, implement, and complete emissions analysis associated with Ohio's CMAQ Program (funded through ODOT suballocations) and evaluate and prioritize Kentucky CMAQ project selection, as requested by KYTC.
- KYOVA will perform conformity analysis due to the South Coast Air Quality Management District
 v. EPA where the federal court vacated portions of the 2015 EPA rules for ozone for Boyd, Cabell,
 and Wayne Counties that were previously designated as a maintenance area for the 1997 8 hour ozone standard. These counties are in attainment for the 2008 8-hour ozone standard.
- Maintain an up-to-date transportation conformity model (air quality) and determination of emission changes for proposed Ohio CMAQ projects, as needed.
- Review/update of modeling hardware/software and contract with consultants to assist KYOVA with the air quality conformity and modeling.

- 1. Air quality planning and technical assistance for project identification, evaluations which will identify transportation strategies to support emissions reduction from on-road mobile sources of pollution.

PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT

Training and travel required to aid the KYOVA staff in air quality, conformity determination and Congestion Mitigation activities. This may include but is not limited to meetings, conferences, and training activities with WVDOT/WVDOH, KYTC, ODOT, FHWA; FTA, EPA, Ohio Association of Regional Councils (OARC); National Transit Institute (NTI), National Highway Institute (NHI), National Association of Regional Councils (NARC) Conferences, National Association of Development Organizations (NADO) Annual Training Conference, Washington Policy Conference, National Regional Transportation Conference; Kentuckians for Better Transportation (KBT) Annual Conference and meetings, Association of Metropolitan Planning Organizations (AMPO) Annual Conference, and American Association of State Highway and Transportation Officials (AASHTO) Planning Conferences/GIS Transportation Symposium.

GOALS

To engage the public, community stakeholders, local officials, and the Interagency Consultation Group (IAC) in the transportation planning process according to the methods outlined in the Huntington, WV-KY-OH Urbanized Area (KYOVA) Participation Plan and to ensure that the Participation Plan is compliant with the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA)/Bipartisan Infrastructure Law (BIL).

METHODOLOGY

Public involvement provide transportation agencies and the public with a means for exchanging information about planning and project development activities. When effective, public involvement activities enable the public to participate in transportation decision making. Transportation professionals need to measure the impact of public involvement activities to ensure that they are successful and an efficient use of public resources. In addition, repeated measurement can track an agency's performance over time, demonstrating ongoing commitment to public involvement and increasing overall accountability in the transportation decision-making process. To ensure that the public is engaged with the transportation planning activities within the Huntington, WV-KY-OH Planning Area and to ensure that no person, on the grounds of race, color, sex, age, disability, or national origin, is excluded from participation in, denied the benefits of, or be otherwise subject to discrimination under any KYOVA program or activity, KYOVA will complete the following activities.

1. Public Involvement and Public Outreach Activities

All public participation activities (public notice, public meetings, maps, visualization techniques, social media, website enhancement, etc.) should be employed during updates, amendments, and administrative modifications/adjustments of the MTP, TIP, Coordinated Public Transit-Human Services Transportation Plan, Participation Plan. To ensure a comprehensive, coordinated, and continuous (3C) participation process that encourage public participation by

- Encouraging public participation utilizing Virtual Public Involvement (VPI) tools while continuing
 a public participation process for individuals without access to computers and mobile devices
 and target demand-response service towards communities with higher concentrations of older
 adults and those with poor access to essential services.
- Providing timely public notices and public access to key decisions and satisfactorily address Environmental Justice (EJ) and Title VI concerns.
- Public outreach activities which include providing timely public notices and public access to key decisions and satisfactorily address Environmental Justice (EJ) and Title VI concerns, publications to the general public such as flyers, newsletters, and handouts; involvement of the local officials, general public, etc. on transportation committees; inclusion of planning activities for access to

- essential services, including multi-modal transportation connectivity gap analysis and plan to address identified gaps (Access to Opportunity)
- Social media account oversight (Facebook, Twitter, Zoom, etc.), sponsor public workshops and meetings to distribute and discuss the transportation planning process and/or project specific activities to include the expenses of hosting workshops and meetings both at KYOVA and outside the office to accommodate for space to encourage KYOVA committee and the community's participation.
- Host and/or participate, as needed, in workshops and/or meetings on key transportation issues, projects, and training activities that engage the local officials and all users of the transportation system, (disadvantaged and underrepresented, persons with disabilities, and the community-at-large). Emphasis will be placed on engaging those that traditionally have not been involved in the transportation planning process but will include all persons within the KYOVA planning area. Consultant(s) support may be utilized for these activities.
- The public involvement process should increase transparency into the decision making process and will be reviewed and updated regularly to ensure it meets and/or exceeds the federal requirements.
- 2. <u>Compliant Documents to Provide Guidance and Procedures</u>
 - Maintaining an up to date Participation Plan and Title VI/LEP Plan.
 - Revisions and required public notices published in the newspaper of the largest circulation (or as specified by federal regulation) in the Huntington, WV-KY-OH Urbanized Area for the KYOVA's Participation Plan, Title VI/LEP Plan, Metropolitan Transportation Plan (MTP), Transportation Improvement Program (TIP), the Coordinated Public Transit-Human Services Transportation Plan, and other federally mandated documents.
 - Develop criteria and measurement tools for EJ components when evaluating projects to be advanced through the planning process to include mapping to determine permissible funding for projects identified in the Title VI and EJ communities.
- 3. <u>Technical Assistance to the WV Association of Metropolitan Planning Organizations (WVAMPO)</u> Technical and administrative assistance to the West Virginia Association of Metropolitan Planning Organizations (MPO) for coordination and outreach activities between the WV MPOs, WVDOH, FHWA, EPA, DAQ, FTA, etc.

- 3. Technical and administrative assistance to the West Virginia Association of MPOs, as needed.

GOALS

To develop the foundation for sustainable development through interagency cooperative practices and management strategies that target increased accessibility; cleaner air and water; improved health conditions; broad-based economic and community development through the metropolitan planning process and surface transportation planning. KYOVA is the primary link between the local governments and is solely responsible for the programming of locally sponsored, federally funded projects in the KYOVA Metropolitan Planning Area.

METHODOLOGY

KYOVA is responsible for project selection and programing through allocation of Surface Transportation Block Grant (STBG) Program suballocated funds, a federal-aid highway flexible funding program that supports a broad range of surface transportation needs. KYOVA, serving as the primary link between the local governments, developed a STBG Program application process which ranks projects based on predetermined criteria that integrate transportation, land-use, air quality, and employment opportunities. To ensure projects meet the federal eligibility guidelines, the following methodology will be applied.

- STBG projects must meet specific federal eligibility guidelines. To ensure the projects meet eligibility KYOVA will: assist applicants in the STBG Program application process; facilitate communication between local governments, state, and federal agencies; and establish the priorities for the local Surface Transportation Block Grant Program (STBG) Program and implement the Program of Projects (POP).
- 2. Track the funding commitments of identified projects [specifically the Surface Transportation Block Grant (STBG) Program] to ensure that progress is being made in securing funds and advancing local priorities toward implementation. With this tracking, Performance Measures will be identified as directed in the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA)/Bipartisan Infrastructure Law (BIL) cooperatively with WVDOT/WVDOH, KYTC, ODOT, FHWA, and FTA to integrate and develop a reporting process that will make progress toward the Safety Performance Management, Pavement, Bridge, Highway Safety Improvement Program, and the Highway Asset Management Plans for NHS.
- 3. To support future development of the transportation system in the Huntington, WV-KY-OH Urbanized area, KYOVA will develop practices that sustain and expand bicycle/pedestrian facilities and supports development of a regional bike/pedestrian system; initiates or builds upon data, studies, or reports that advance a more balanced intermodal transportation network inclusive of

such modes as walking, biking, public transit, and paratransit; supports and assists to coordinate activities amongst agencies and modes interested in the future of transportation; and continues to support local governments and the community by identifying funding opportunities.

GOALS

To provide on-going transit planning support, assistance, research and analysis to the various federally funded committees, boards, and officials of the Tri-State Transit Authority (TTA), Lawrence County Transit (LCT), other transit service providers and decision-makers in West Virginia and Ohio; continue development of the Regional Models of Cooperation; and maintain the KYOVA Coordinated Public Transit-Human Services Transportation Plan, which integrates all aspects of transit and mobility to ensure an adequate level of access to all populations while improving the range of options for meeting diverse mobility needs.

METHODOLOGY

1. Transit Planning

KYOVA will support and promote transit planning activities that provides better connection for residents via public transit to regional employment opportunities, health care facilities, schools, grocery stores, etc. These activities may include but not be limited to:

- KYOVA will provide technical support for FTA Section 5307, 5303, 5310, and 5303 transit programs and activities to transit systems that operate within the boundary of the KYOVA Metropolitan Planning Area.
 - Allocations of Sections 5307 and 5339 funding will be agreed upon by the transit agencies through a "Split Letter"/MOU initiated by TTA and supported by KYOVA.
- Provide Section 5310 application assistance to Tri-State Transit Authority (TTA), Lawrence County Transit (LCT) and other transit service providers and decision-makers (Regional Models of Cooperation).
- To better understand and accommodate for future transit routes it is necessary to identify the needs and conditions of the bus stops and shelters and to ensure they are ADA compliant. KYOVA will assist in the reporting of these items, whether in coordination with a consultant or completed by the individual transit agencies within the KYOVA planning area.
- Identification of priority projects for seniors, individuals with disabilities and individuals with lower incomes; collection of data/surveys regarding ridership.
- To achieve better intermodal connectivity KYOVA will coordinate integration with bicycle and pedestrian planning and projects.
- Monitor and record of fixed route service indicators and demand response services to compare service standards on a system-side and route level basis.

- Assist transit agencies with identifying a state of good repair that will help transit agencies to prioritize funding to achieve or maintain existing networks as directed by the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA)/Bipartisan Infrastructure Law (BIL).
- To advance racial equity and support for the underserved and disadvantaged communities (EO 13985), KYOVA will coordinate with providers of public transportation.
- Review and/or recommend routes or service changes for the local transit agencies (Tri-State Transit Authority (WV) and Lawrence County Transit (OH)).
- Database and GIS/data file of the TTA and LCT transit routes, stops, and schedules as provided by the transit agencies to produce summary of reports for products such as system wide data, bus stop location GIS maps, comparisons based on the inclusion of past on-board survey data and project prioritization, while placing an emphasis on compliance with FTA guidelines and promoting transit connectivity and safety and security; integration with bicycle and pedestrian planning.
- 2. Administration and Reporting
 - Perform TIP and MTP updates (Administrative Modifications, Amendments) and update financial tables within these documents.
 - Update Transit Asset and Safety Performance Measures based on data provided by the transit agencies.
 - Title VI/Environmental Justice/LEP Plan updates and reports
 - Preparation and distribution of the "Annual Federally Obligated Funds" report.
 - Assistance to transit providers with the Transit Asset Management (TMA) Plan, the Public Transportation Agency Safety Plan (PTASP)
 - Maintain and document agency MOUs and/or "Split Letter" regarding Sections 5310, 5307, and 5339.
 - Monitor and implement Performance Measures, as coordinated with WVDOT/WVDOH, KYTC, ODOT, FHWA, FTA, etc., related to transit asset management and transit safety that are consistent with the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA)/Bipartisan Infrastructure Law (BIL) federal transportation legislation.

GOALS

Shared coordination and oversight activities with the Tri-State Transit Authority (TTA) regarding the competitive process for the KYOVA Interstate Planning Commission (Huntington, WV-KY-OH Urbanized Area) Section 5310 program funds. Section 5310 Program authorizes federal capital and operating assistance grants which are intended to enhance mobility for seniors and persons with disabilities and to serve the special needs of transit dependent populations beyond traditional public transportation services and American with Disabilities Act (ADA) complementary paratransit services.

METHODOLOGY

KYOVA will provide the following assistance and support to fulfill the Section 5310 TMA Transit Administration work element as outlined in the MOU between KYOVA Interstate Planning Commission and Tri-State Transit Authority (TTA).

- 1. Jointly, the Tri-State Transit Authority (TTA), who serves as the Designated Recipient, and KYOVA Interstate Planning Commission, will share Section 5310 program administration duties and administration funds for the Huntington, WV-KY-OH Urbanized Area as specified by a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU). Administrative Funds are distributed on a 50/50 basis.
- Continuing with the previous transportation bills (MAP-21 and the FAST Act), funding eligibility of Section 5310 Program are utilized for operating costs for transportation services in addition to capital costs. A Review Committee, with input from KYOVA and TTA, will determine the annual percentage of Section 5310 funds allocated to the type of project. (No less than 55 percent of Section 5310 Program funding in any given year may be allocated to capital projects).
- 3. The Huntington, WV-KY-OH Section 5310 Program Management Plan (PMP), which will be administered jointly between KYOVA and TTA, will be the basis as to how the awards are distributed to eligible recipients; therefore, the Huntington, WV-KY-OH Urbanized Area proposes to adhere to the Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) between KYOVA and TTA for the Section 5310 program administration responsibilities. KYOVA will perform the following tasks: conduct an annual "call for projects"; develop a prioritized scoring process for Section 5310 application review; host Section 5310 informational session; designate a review committee to prioritize transit projects; update the Coordinated Public Transit-Human Services Transportation Plan, as needed, ensure projects and agencies are included in the Coordinated Plan; and perform recordkeeping pertaining to eligible administrative cost for the purposes of management in the Transit Award Management System (TrAMS). TTA, as the Designated Recipient, will be responsible for presenting information on the types of vehicles available through the procurement and program; vehicle procurement and follow-up, including pre-award and post-delivery audits; collection Section 5310 grant awardees;

submission of grant application and quarterly reports in the Transit Award Management System (TrAMS). KYOVA may be available to assist with additional responsibilities as requested by TTA to ensure the success of the 5310 Program implementation and administration.

GOALS

To support and perform transit operation planning to the Lawrence County Transit (LCT) for a minimum of three (3) years – FY 2022, FY 2023, and FY 2024 and not to exceed five (5) years. Administrative cost payable to KYOVA from LCT for three consecutive years (and not to exceed five (5) years) or until funding is expended is \$615,000 at an estimated cost of \$41,000 per year.

PROJECT HISTORY

Beginning FY 2022 (July 1, 2021), following an analysis of the pilot* program, including the routes, ridership, and additional growth opportunities, Lawrence County Transit introduced significant changes to the existing routes resulting in new service and increased ridership to frequent commuter destinations. Providing increased ridership relates to a reduction in fuel consumption and emissions of individual cars or trucks, thus improving air quality. ODOT approved CMAQ funding for fiscal years 2022, 2023 and 2024 for an FY total of \$205,000 with a three (3) year Total Cost of \$615,000. Matching funds of 20% for the three (3) years will be \$123,000 or \$41,000 each year to initiate this service.

* Lawrence County Public Transit System has operated a pilot shuttle service connecting destinations in Ironton, South Point and Proctorville, Ohio, Ashland, Kentucky, and Huntington, West Virginia since 2017.

METHODOLOGY

LCT was provided funding to provide transportation services within Ironton, Ohio and the urbanized area of Lawrence County, Ohio with service to Huntington, WV and Ashland, KY. KYOVA will provide transit operation and support to the LCT in regard to the Deviated Fixed Route CMAQ funded project. Additional planning assistance include coordination activities with LCT to explore opportunities to promote and sustain transit services within their service area and assist in identifying a state of good repair that will help the transit agencies in prioritizing funding to achieve or maintain transit networks as addressed in the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA)/Bipartisan Infrastructure Law (BIL) and previous transportation legislation (FAST Act).

RESPONSIBLE AGENCY

KYOVA Interstate Planning Commission in cooperation with the Lawrence County Transit and the ODOT Office of Transit.

PRODUCTS KYOVA

Activities:

KYOVA has committed \$615,000 to support LCT's new deviated fixed route service and planning over a minimum of three (3) years and not to exceed five (5) years using KYOVA's Congestion Mitigation and Air Quality (CMAQ) suballocated funds including local funds (\$123,000) for operation support and LCT FTA Section 5303 funds for planning operation to be conducted by KYOVA. *Note: FY* 2024 funds will not be provided by CMAQ but by LCT. KYOVA will perform the following to assist LCT in transit planning/activities:

- KYOVA will assist with transit planning, evaluation of transit services, provision of data, conformity analysis for identified projects, if required, and the creation of improvements to these services.
- KYOVA will assist in the identification of potential grants and other funding sources for use by LCT.
- KYOVA will provide information to LCT and ILCAO staff on federal compliance issues as they arise.
- KYOVA may assist LCT and ILCAO with the implementation of purchasing service agreements with other agencies and organizations, as requested.

Lawrence County Transit System will perform the following (no charge to work element):

 During FY2024 LCT will operate a public transportation program funded by funds allocated by LCT. Note: following a Lawrence County Transit CMAQ Analysis/Study completed in 2020, a new service was developed to better serve the community. The new service began July 1, 2021 and will conclude no

no funds from the CMAQ program will be utilized.

- 2. LCT will work closely with KYOVA and ILCAO to ensure effective communication.
- LCT will pay KYOVA from its FTA Section 5307 or other designated funds a rate up to \$20,500 per year for three (3) consecutive years based on quarterly installments or up to five (5) years until

for the FTA Section 5307 funds.

- 4. LCT will utilize designated funds to cover the operating costs of the deviated fixed route shuttle service that targets daily commuters between major employers and universities between the three principal cities of Ironton, Ohio; Ashland, Kentucky; and Huntington, West Virginia.
- 5. LCT will provide the vehicles and all ancillary equipment necessary to operate the routes as recommend in the CMAQ Analysis/Study.
- 6. LCT has contracted with ILCAO to serve as the administrative party for the newly established routes.
- 7. LCT will meet all local, state, and federal requirements associated with the operation of the newly established CMAQ funded service including any necessary drug and alcohol testing, National Transit Database reporting, and other pertinent federal requirements.

- Perform TIP and MTP updates (Administrative Modification, Amendments) and update financial tables within these documents to ensure project inclusion into the Kentucky STIP through updates, administrative modifications, and amendments. These efforts will be coordinated with KYTC – Office of Transportation Delivery, KYTC – Central Office/Division of Planning and the Ashland Bus System.
- Unified Planning Work Program activities to include amendments and/or modifications to the FY 2024 UPWP; Draft and final approval of FY 2025 UPWP;
- Process invoicing, progress reports, budgets, and necessary revisions of financial and administrative funds, and updates of prospectus and contracts (when warranted), and expenses for meeting room rentals, copying of documents, etc.
- Maintain current and up to date Title VI/Environmental Justice/LEP Plan updates and reports
- Preparation and distribution of the "Annual Federally Obligated Funds" report as specified by KYTC Central Office/Division of Planning.

- Assistance to transit providers with the Transit Asset Management (TMA) Plan, the Public Transportation Agency Safety Plan (PTASP)
- Maintain and document agency MOUs and/or "Split Letter" regarding Sections 5310, 5307, and 5339.
- Monitor and implement Performance Measures, as coordinated with WVDOT/WVDOH, KYTC, ODOT, FHWA, FTA, etc., related to transit asset management and transit safety that are consistent with the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA)/Bipartisan Infrastructure Law (BIL) federal transportation legislation.
- Staff support and assistance with the Coordinated Public Transit-Human Services Transportation Plan update scheduled in FY 2024 see item #3.
- 3. <u>Coordinated Public Transit-Human Services Transportation Plan (Coordinated Plan)</u> The Coordinated Plan identifies the transportation needs of individuals with disabilities, older adults, and people with low incomes, provides strategies for meeting these needs, and prioritizes transportation services for funding and implementation. Federal transit law also requires that projects selected for funding under the Section 5310 Program be included in a locally developed coordinated public transit-human services transportation plan. During FY 2024, KYOVA will update their 2019 Coordinated Plan using the services of an outside consultant.
- <u>All other transit related activities and/or projects</u> All other transit related activities and/or projects not specifically identified in the Transportation Planning and Coordination Activities (#1) or Administration and Reporting (#2).





MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING

This Memorandum of Understanding made and entered into this $\int \frac{5+1}{2} day$ of $\frac{1}{100}$, 2013, is for the purpose of recognizing the current Ohio and West Virginia designation of the Medopolitan Planning Organization (KYOVA) and the redesignation of Kentucky as a body of KYOVA; and for allocation of shared work element reimbursements among the States of West Virginia, Kentucky and Ohio associated with the annual united Planning Work Program (UPWP).

WITNESSETH

WHEREAS, the states of West Virginia and Ohio continue to recognize the previous designation of KYOVA to serve as the MPO for the Huntington Urbanized Area (UZA) for Cabell County, West Virginia; Wayne County, West Virginia; and Lawrence County, Ohio; and

WHEREAS, the State of Kentucky formally requested and received redesignation for KYOVA to serve as the MPO for the Huntington UZA for Boyd County, Kentucky and Greenup County, Kentucky; and

WHEREAS, the United States Bureau of the Census on March 27, 2012 defined Huntington, WV-KY-OH Urbanized Area with a population of 202,637 and

WHEREAS, the United States Secretary of Transportation, on July 18, 2012, designated Huntington, WV-KY-OH as a new Transportation Management Area; and

WHEREAS, KYOVA Interstate Planning Commission is the designated Metropolitan Planning Organization since 1968 for the Huntington, WV-KY-OH urbanized area; and

WHEREAS, KYOVA Interstate Planning Commission approved the federally prescribed Transportation Management Area Boundaries defined by the United States Bureau of Census and the United States Secretary of Transportation as its official planning boundaries for Huntington, WV-KY-OH Urbanized Area on December 12, 2012;

WHEREAS, KYOVA, an interstate planning commission formed under Chapter 8, Article 4C, Section 1, Official Code of West Virginia, 1931, as amended, now operated under revised Chapter 8, Article 26, Sections 1 through 5,; Section 713.30 through 713.34, Ohio Revised Code and Chapter 65, Kentucky Revised Statuses is authorized and willing to represent the counties and cities in continuing the transportation planning process; and

WHEREAS, in addition to By-Laws, an existing "Prospectus" will remain in effect, in accordance with Federal transportation planning guidelines, which will articulate the objectives, functions, organization and operation of KYOVA; and

WHEREAS, KYOVA, acting as an agent of the parties participating in the Interstate Commission, may receive financial assistance from the United States of America, from the States of Kentucky, Ohio and West Virginia, from its constituent counties and local governments, and from private sources, and may enter into contracts for such assistance; and

WHEREAS, KYOVA shall serve as the MPO for the area encompassing portions of: Cabell County, West Virginia; Wayne County, West Virginia; Boyd County, Kentucky; Greenup County, Kentucky; and Lawrence County, Ohio; and shall coordinate activities with adjoining metropolitan planning organizations and other relevant state, metropolitan, county and nonmetropolitan planning agencies; and

WHEREAS, an annual UPWP and Budget will be prepared by KYOVA, and expenses in developing certain items in conjunction with completion of the UPWP that can best be performed without regard for political boundaries, shall be charged to each of the States of Kentucky, West Virginia, and Ohio based on an urbanized population percentage from the most recent U.S. Census Bureau data (2010); and

WHEREAS, nothing in this Memorandum of Understanding is intended to contravene and does not supersede any existing legal authority or planning functions of the participating states, counties, cities, towns or villages with respect to powers and functions provided through enabling legislation and/or executive powers,

NOW, THEREFORE, the signatories hereto do hereby agree that:

- 1. This Memorandum of Understanding hereby establishes the current Ohio and West Virginia designation of the Metropolitan Planning Organization (KYOVA) and the redesignation of Kentucky as a body of KYOVA.
- 2. The cost associated with elements of the work program and operations that are of regional significance be charged on a percentage basis (*) effective 7/1/2014 as follows:

Kentucky	31%
West Virginia	50%
Ohio	19%

*May be limited to funds available to each state.

* Percentages to be used for FY-2014 are reflected in attached letter which was submitted to WV on 4/22/2013

*The 2010 Census identified the Huntington Urbanized Area (UZA) as a Transportation Management Area (TMA) with a total population of 202,637. The population breakdown by state is: Kentucky - 56,594 West Virginia - 112, 268 Ohio - 33,775

*As outlined in the Memorandum of Understanding between RIC MPO and KYOVA MPO, for air quality, familiarity, planning history and many other reasons, the planning area for RIC and KYOVA in West Virginia will remain as previously designated by the State of West Virginia, to the county boundaries. Therefore, the total TMA population (202,637) less the portion of Putnam County within the TMA area (22.547) was used in the population percentage calculation per State.

- Any additional planning funds from Kentucky, West Virginia or Ohio that are not used for funding shared work elements of the UPWP can be used to fund state-specific planning activities.
- 4. West Virginia shall be recognized as the lead state in the operation of KYOVA MPO.
- 5. This Memorandum of Understanding will take effect on the date hereof and will continue in effect until amended.

MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING

FOR THE PLANNING, COORDINATION, AND FUNDING PROCEDURES AMONG KYOVA INTERSTATE PLANNING COMMISSION; WEST VIRGINIA DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION (WVDOT)/WEST VIRGINIA DIVISION OF HIGHWAYS (WVDOH); KENTUCKY TRANSPORTATION CABINET (KYTC); OHIO DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION (ODOT); WEST VIRGINIA DEPARTMENT OF ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION (WVDEP); KENTUCKY DEPARTMENT FOR ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION (KYDEP)/KENTUCKY DIVISION FOR AIR QUALITY (KYDAQ); OHIO ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION AGENCY (OEPA); REGIONAL INTERGOVERNMENTAL COUNCIL (RIC); TRI-STATE TRANSIT AUTHORITY (TTA); CITY OF ASHLAND/ASHLAND BUS SYSTEM (ABS); AND LAWRENCE COUNTY PORT AUTHORITY (LCPA) IN CONSULTATION WITH FHWA OFFICES OF WEST VIRGINIA, KENTUCKY, AND OHIO; FTA REGIONS III, IV, AND V; EPA REGIONS III, IV, AND V FOR THE HUNTINGTON, WV-KY-OH TRANSPORTATION MANAGEMENT AREA (TMA)

This Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) is a three state, multi-agency agreement addressing the interagency coordination affecting the transportation planning process for the Huntington, WV-KY-OH Transportation Management Area (TMA) between the following parties (hereinafter referred to as the AGENCIES), pursuant to 23 USC 134, 49 USC 5303, and 40 CFR 93. The parties to this MOU agree to cooperatively participate in the metropolitan transportation planning and air quality transportation conformity processes for the *Huntington, WV-KY-OH* Urbanized Area. The parties further agree that the KYOVA Policy Committee, serving as the designated MPO for the *Huntington, WV-KY-OH* Urbanized Area, will direct the metropolitan transportation planning and transportation air quality conformity processes and will facilitate the federal, state, and local agencies' active participation in the processes. KYOVA's metropolitan transportation planning program will result in the development and approval of three principal products: 1) a quadrennially updated 20-year Multimodal Transportation Plan with a US DOT conformity determination; and 3) an annually updated Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP) and budget.

Recognizing the geographic and organization complexities of this three-state urbanized area, as documented below, this MOU confirms the parties' participation within the Huntington, WV-KY-OH Urbanized Area planning process and serves as an umbrella agreement recognizing a series of supplementary agreements between KYOVA and the respective state and regional agencies recording their individual planning process coordination procedures.

On July 18, 2012 the Huntington, WV-KY-OH Urbanized Area was designated as a Transportation Management Area (TMA). KYOVA is one of two MPOs that share joint planning responsibilities for the TMA, which includes the West Virginia counties of Cabell and Wayne, Kentucky counties of Boyd and Greenup, and the urbanized area of Lawrence County, Ohio. The other MPO, the Regional Intergovernmental Council (RIC), is responsible for the transportation planning activities

for the West Virginia counties of Kanawha and Putnam Counties, of which only a portion of Putnam County falls within the TMA boundary. Furthermore, KYOVA is served by three separate DOTs (West Virginia, Kentucky, and Ohio), three state air quality agencies (WVDEP, KYDEP/KYDAQ and OEPA), three Federal Highway Administration Division Offices (West Virginia, Kentucky, and Ohio), three regions of the Federal Transit Agency (Region III, IV and V), three regions of the Environmental Protection Agency (Regions III, IV, and V), and three local transit agencies (Tri-State Transit Authority, City of Ashland (Ashland Bus System), and the Lawrence County Port Authority operating as Lawrence County Transit (LCT).

KYOVA's first TMA Certification occurred in the Spring of 2016. At that time, it was recommended for the agency to complete agreement(s) as required by 23 CFR 450.314. Therefore, this Umbrella Agreement documents the understandings between all AGENCIES and outlines how each will coordinate to the best of their ability, use their own agreements within their state for planning purposes, and provide for a dispute resolution process.

A list of the state and regional agencies coordinating with the agreement(s) is as follows (a listing of each agreement/MOU as it relates to AGENCIES will be provided later in this MOU):

- West Virginia Department of Transportation (WVDOT)/West Virginia Division of Highways (WVDOH)
- Kentucky Transportation Cabinet (KYTC)
- Ohio Department of Transportation (ODOT)
- West Virginia Department of Environmental Protection (WVDEP)
- Kentucky Department for Environmental Protection (KYDEP)/Kentucky Division for Air Quality (KYDAQ)
- Ohio Environmental Protection Agency (OEPA)
- KYOVA Interstate Planning Commission (KYOVA)
- Regional Intergovernmental Council (RIC)
- Tri-State Transit Authority (TTA)
- City of Ashland/Ashland Bus System (ABS)
- Lawrence County Port Authority (LCPA)

These agreements are not in place of, or in conflict with, any existing MOUs, agreements, or laws of the United States, and are to provide the basis for coordinated efforts to cooperatively determine each party's mutual responsibilities in carrying out the metropolitan transportation planning process within the Huntington, WV-KY-OH Transportation Management Area (TMA) Urbanized Area as designated on July 18, 2012.

DISPUTES

KYOVA hereby agrees to adhere to the *Dispute Policies* as outlined in the annual and/or biennial agreements with WVDOH/WVDOT, KYTC, and ODOT. AGENCY(IES) that do not fall under the contracted activities with WVDOH/WVDOT, KYTC, or ODOT hereby agrees to, attempt in good faith to, resolve any dispute or claim arising out of or in relation to the Agreement through informal negotiations between authorized AGENCY representatives from each of the AGENCIES involved. AGENCIES shall notify KYOVA of the dispute in writing and request a review, within sixty (60) days after the dispute occurred. In such, the AGENCY(IES) notification shall present evidentiary matters to support the AGENCY(IES) position. Within thirty (30) days, KYOVA will respond to AGENCY(IES) dispute and attempt resolution through informal negotiations between the disputed AGENCIES. If the dispute cannot be settled amicably within sixty (60) days from the first date on which the KYOVA has contacted each AGENCY within the dispute, then a mediation will occur by a mutual third-party mediator before resorting to termination or the Agreement or further dispute resolution.

TERMINATION AND MODIFICATION

This MOU may be reviewed every four (4) years, or as needed as rules, regulations, laws, or designations change. It may be amended, whenever deemed appropriate, by written agreement of all AGENCIES. However, it is the intent of the AGENCIES to carry out the metropolitan planning process on a continuous, cooperative, and comprehensive basis with minimal modifications or terminations. Therefore, this MOU will remain in effect until terminated or replaced by a new MOU. Any AGENCY subject to this MOU may withdraw from the MOU by giving sixty (60) days written notice to KYOVA, at which time KYOVA will notify all other agencies subject to the MOU. If this occurs, the AGENCIES agree to consult further to determine whether the issue(s) can be resolved and the MOU re-implemented in an amended form. In the event that an AGENCY withdraws from this MOU, the rights and responsibilities of the remaining AGENCIES will remain unchanged with respect to each other until this MOU is amended or replaced.

In the event that this MOU requires modification, addition of new MOUs, or for any other reason, the required modifications may be accomplished through the execution of a letter modification or supplemental agreement addressed to KYOVA who will distribute to all AGENCIES subject to this MOU. This MOU may be replaced with a new MOU at any time upon the written consent of all remaining signatory agencies. Once this MOU is replaced, it will become null and void.

All participating AGENCIES agree to the following clause edits:

- 1. Perform the roles and responsibilities outlined in their agreement(s), contract(s), or understanding(s) located in the attachment;
- 2. Conduct necessary updates, or revisions to their agreement(s), contract(s), or understanding(s) located in the attachment as needed that will not affect the terms of this agreement; and
- 3. Comply with the terms of this MOU.

Therefore, this cooperative MOU is entered among the AGENCIES listed above and any subsequent amended parties.
